Emergent Church

Philip Clayton, Dean of the Claremont School of Theology, has written a recent Op-Ed for the LA Times highlighting the growth in those who no longer identify with any institutional faith. The "Rise of the Nones" presents communities of faith with new challenges and new opportunities. Clayton's answer is to promote the Emerging Church movement. "It's a movement based on understanding the reasons for mainstream religion's dramatic decline: improved scientific understanding, changing social norms, an increasingly pluralistic religious culture and more freedom to doubt and question — a freedom that until the last three centuries was mostly absent or suppressed and that is still resisted, sometimes violently, in much of the world today." Tennessee: Teaching Evolution

Tennessee has approved a bill that will protect teachers who wish to promote "alternate" theories in the science classroom. As Lucas Johnson of the AP states, "the bill says it would encourage critical thinking by protecting teachers from discipline if they help students critique scientific weaknesses". Creationism and intelligent design would be allowed as part of this "critique." Advocates of the bill claim that it improves academic freedom, while its critics see it as an open door to the promotion of pseudoscience and religious doctrine within the public school system.

In 2009, there were 120,000 United Methodists residing in Tennessee. In its 2008 Book of Discipline, the United Methodist Church affirms "science as a legitimate interpretation of God's natural world" and "that science's descriptions of cosmological, geological, and biological evolution are not in conflict with theology."
