On May 20, Dr. Jennifer Wiseman, Senior Project Scientist for NASA's Hubble Space Telescope and current Director of the Dialogue on Science, Ethics, and Religion (DoSER) for the American Association for the Advancement of Science addressed an audience at Hughes United Methodist Church in Wheaton, MD. Her talk, "Exploring an Incredible Universe!: Science Inspiring Praise, Study, and Service" focused on recent technological and scientific developments in astronomy with many visual images taken by the Hubble telescope. Upgrades of the telescopes capabilities provide an unprecedented peek into deep space and into the distant past. The Dalai Lama was the recipient of this year's Templeton Prize. The Templeton Prize "honors a living person who has made an exceptional contribution to affirming life's spiritual dimension, whether through insight, discovery, or practical works". Dr. John M. The article was based on the newly released U. S. Religious Census published by The Association of Statisticians of American Religious Bodies (ASARB). The ASARB 2010 U. S. Religious Census "is an update of the 1952, 1971, 1980, 1990, and 2000 studies originally done by the National Council of Churches and the Glenmary Research Center. Since 1990, the Association of Statisticians of American Religious Bodies (ASARB) has sponsored the studies."
