There are a number of events coming up in the coming year. A few of these are listed below.

Empire and Economics: The Difference Religion Makes

Dr. Joerg Rieger will deliver the 2012 Susan R. Andrews Progressive Theology Lecture on October 1, 2012 at 7:00 PM, Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church in Bethesda, Maryland. Dr. Rieger is the Wendland-Cook Endowed Professor of Constructive Theology at Perkins Theological Seminary in Dallas.

His topic, "Empire and Economics: The Difference Religion Makes", presents a radical view of early Christians as social revolutionaries who worked actively to transform the empire of their day. His books include No Rising Tide, Christ and Empire, and Globalization and Theology, each a study of how the early church modeled resistance by poor, marginalized and alienated populations to the dominant political and economic forces of empire. The Blackstone Seminar 2012 - The Spirit in the Synapse: Neuroscience & Religion

On October 22, 2012, the 2012 Blackstone Seminar for Science, Theology, Ethics, & Ministry will welcome **Dr. Jeffrey Pugh** to discuss the relationship between neuroscience and religion. There are some cognitive scientists today who argue that God is a figment of our imagination; that God, and by extension, religion, were created by brain structures to serve an evolutionary purpose. Because we understand how the brain created religion, we can now give religion up as an unnecessary vestige of our primordial past. Dr. Pugh's presentations will explore this perspective and argue that another interpretation is possible. Looking at the evidence that brain scans, cognitive science, and evolutionary biology offer, we might find that our brains have developed in order that we might grasp the reality of God in the world and in our lives. Dr. Jeffrey C. Pugh is the Maude Sharpe Powell Professor of Religious Studies at Elon University,. Dr. Pugh is the author of "Entertaining the Triune Mystery: God, Science, and the Space Between", "Devil's ink: Blog from the Basement Office", and "Religionless Christianity: Dietrich Bonhoeffer in Troubled Times".

Atom + Eve Project: Primate "Ethics" and Human Morality

This program, the third of four seminars sponsored by the Templeton Foundations, take place on November 10th at the Washington Theological Union in Takoma Park, Maryland. It will focus on recent studies of group behavior in higher primates which is homologous to human competition and cooperation, and look at the evolutionary roots of human morality. Catholic biblical and moral theologians will lay out a contemporary view of evil, theodicy, original sin and moral life that is harmonious with contemporary science.
