October 25: William Philips and James Miller to address The Presbyterian Association on Science, Technology and the Christian Faith

On October 25 at Potomac Presbyterian Church in Potomac, Maryland, The Presbyterian Association on Science, Technology and the Christian Faith will



hold its annual meeting with a program featuring **William Daniel Phillips**, PhD (Nobel Laureate, Physics, 1997) and **Rev. James Bradley Miller**, PhD.

In 1997, Dr. Phillips shared the Nobel Prize in Physics "for development of methods to cool and trap atoms with laser light" at The National Institute of Standards and Technology (then the National Bureau of Standards). He is now the head of the Laser Cooling and Trapping Group in the Quantum Measurement Division of NIST's Physical Measurement Laboratory and also a Fellow of the Joint Quantum Institute, a cooperative research organization of NIST and the University of Maryland. Bill is an active member of Fairhaven United Methodist Church in Gaithersburg, MD where he is a member of Fairhaven's Gospel Choir.

Jim Miller is a retired minister of the Presbyterian Church (USA) who has worked in science and religion for many years including, as the Senior Program Associate for the Program of Dialogue on Science, Ethics, and Religion of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS). He is currently the co-chair of the Broader Social Impact Committee of the Human Origins Program at

the Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History.

The program on the 25th will begin at 7:30. They will address the topic of "Science, Technology and the Christian Life". The program is open to all. More information on the program can be found here.

November 21, 2013: Panel Discussion with Tom Oord, Craig Boyd and Mark Mann

As we have mentioned in prior newsletters, WesleyNexus is sponsoring a free seminar and special presentation on the evening of Thursday November 21st in conjunction with the 200th Anniversary of Old Otterbein Church (in downtown Baltimore next to the Convention Center, 112 W. Conway Street),.







The discussion topic will be "Is Evolution the Enemy of Faith?" Panelists will include WesleyNexus Advisory Board member Dr. Thomas Jay Oord, Professor of Theology at Northwestern Nazarene University, Craig A. Boyd, Assistant Professor of Philosophy at St. Louis University, and Mark A. Mann, Associate Professor of Theology at Point Loma Nazarene University in San Diego. The program will take place prior to the 2013 meetings of the American Academy of Religion and the Society of Biblical Literature, scheduled to begin the following evening on November 22 at the Baltimore Convention Center.

The Thursday night program will begin with a light supper at 6:00 p.m. and run from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. The historic church is within one block walking distance from the convention hotels, and all AAR/SBL members are welcome, as well as members of the public. November 12: Justin L. Barrett to speak at Azuza Pacific University

Justin L. Barrett, Ph.D., Thrive Professor of Developmental Science and director of The Thrive Center for Human Development in Fuller Theological Seminary's School of Psychology, will present "How to Train Your Dragon: The Promise of Cognitive Science of Religion" at Azuza Pacific University in Azuza, CA on November 12. Dr. Barrett is an experimental psychologist who taught for five years in Oxford University's School of Anthropology. He is the author of numerous articles concerning cognitive, developmental, and evolutionary approaches to the study of religion. His authored books are Why Would Anyone Believe in God? (2004), Cognitive Science, Religion, and Theology: From Human Minds to Divine Minds (2011), and Born Believers: The Science of Children's Religious Belief (2012). He edited a four-volume collection called Psychology of Religion (2010).

Common Ground - Science and the Baha'i Faith Common Ground is a working group aimed at creating an active venue for discussion & communication, resource sharing, consultation, learning, study, & community-building for anyone interested in finding common ground in the areas of faith and reason, science and religion.



Contributors include members of the Baha'i Faith with backgrounds ranging from science to literature to philosophy. For the Baha'i "scientific knowledge is the highest attainment upon the human plane, for science is the discoverer of realities. It is of two kinds: material and spiritual. Material science is the investigation of natural phenomena; divine science is the discovery and realization of spiritual verities. The world of humanity must acquire both. A bird has two wings; it cannot fly with one. Material and spiritual science are the two wings of human uplift and attainment. WesleyNexus has been given a small quantity of books by Resurgence Publishing Corporation (RPC) (www.resurgencepublishing.com), a non-profit corporation in the State of Florida, founded in 2004. The company's initial publications are the "Archive Series" focused on the life and works of Joseph Wesley Mathews provided, with family permission, to Wesley Theological



Seminary in Washington DC. In 2009, RPC added a new "Legacy Series" of publications spearheaded by a reprinting of Eternal Values in a World of Change, by Bishop James K. Mathews, and the presentations, talks and workshops of the "Transforming the Legacy Symposium" at Wesley Theological Seminary, honoring the inauguration of the Joseph Wesley Mathews Archives at the Seminary and lifetime work of his brother Bishop James K. Mathews (see RPC Conferencing.) The two volume series resulting from the Symposium was published in late 2010. Books in this series now include God Mask, by Methodist theologian William Arthur Holmes, and the newest title, A Theology of Surprise, by Dr. John Epps, Director of LENS international in Malaysia.
